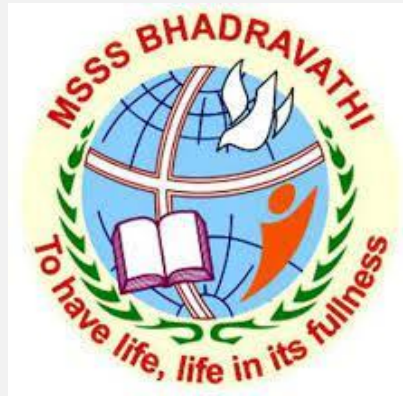

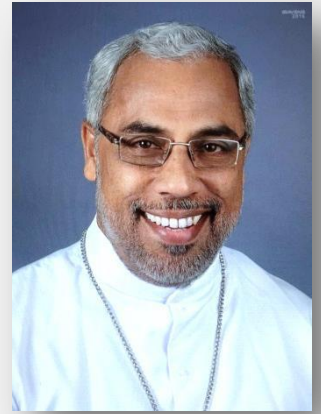
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PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

- Cared for the sick and suffering connected with Cancer and HIV

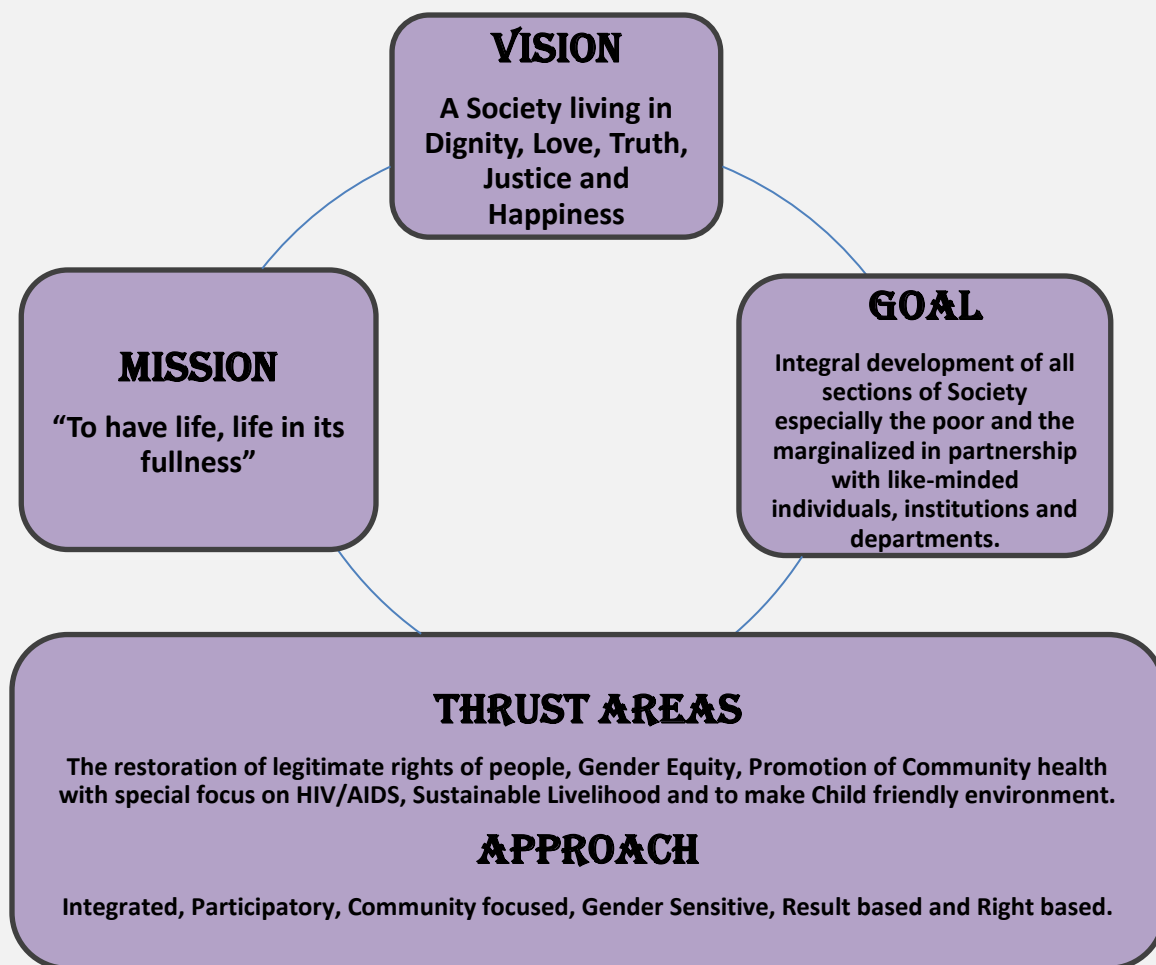

ORGANIZATIONAL PROFILE

The Malnad Social Service Society (MSSS) is a non-profit, secular, and non-political organization dedicated to the social development and well-being of the Syro-Malabar Diocese of Bhadravathi. It is registered with the Ministry of Home Affairs under the Foreign Contribution Regulation Act and the Government of Karnataka Society Registration Act 1960, with registration number No. 219/SOR/SMG/90-91. Under the Income Tax Act of 1961, it is exempt from the 80G tax and is registered under 12A. Shimoga and Chikamagalur districts in the state of Karnataka are included in MSSS's operational region. MSSS started out doing social work in a charitable capacity before progressively switching to welfare and developmental approaches. Currently, MSSS is concentrating on human development, health, and education initiatives, including the empowerment of rural poor people through exposure, training, capacity building, and sensitization using integrated, need-based, and right-based approaches. MSSS prioritizes rural communities' sustainable livelihood development and meets the needs of those with cancer and HIV/AIDS.

For the benefit of society as a whole, MSSS works with like-minded groups and government institutions, forming strong, mutually beneficial networks. Under the direction of the governing board, the society's vision and mission, which are founded on the gospel values, serve as a guide for its participatory functioning.

PROGRAMS HELD

1. CHILD HELP LINE - 1098

In 1998–1999, the Indian government introduced the CHILDLINE Service, and from April 2011, MSSS has been a collaborative entity. A kid in distress or an adult acting on their behalf can call the child line, a 24-hour toll-free phone service, by dialing 1098 on a phone. After providing emergency aid, kid Line refers a kid to the proper organization for either short-term or long-term care or follow-up, depending on the child's needs. In order to reach every kid in crisis intervention and establish a connection to long-term comprehensive development, CHILDLINE seeks to establish a kid Protection Network.



VISION

- A child friendly nation that guarantees the rights and protection of all children

MISSION

- CHILDLINE will reach out to every child in need and ensure their rights and protection through the 4 Cs, 1. Connect, 2. Catalyze 3. Collaborate, 4. Communicate. The service focuses on the needs of children living alone on the streets, child laborers working in unorganized sector, domestic workers and sexually abused children.

The basic objectives of the CHILDLINE Service are as follows:

- In an emergency, children should be attended to and referred to the appropriate governmental and non-governmental organizations.
- To provide a framework that guarantees the protection of children's rights as guaranteed by the Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act of 2000 and the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child.
- To give organizations a forum for networking and to fortify the support networks that aid in children's recovery, particularly under difficult circumstances.
- To make organizations including the public, hospitals, local governments, and the railroads more aware of the issues these kids confront.
- To provide the public a chance to address the needs of kids in challenging situations.

CHILDLINE Shimoga began operations on April 1st, 2011. Every child who calls 1098 receives emergency support through intervention and long-term follow-up, and CHILDLINE Shimoga has played an extremely important role in every way since it was established. The cooperative

organization answers all calls, around-the-clock, and offers the support that is required. When a worried adult alerts the Collab group about a kid in need of protection and care, the organization also takes action. The CHILDLINE Collab organization's main responsibility is to provide efficient networking and training for organizations affiliated with CHILDLINE. It also makes sure that the problems encountered when answering calls are resolved to guarantee the service operates effectively.

Being a city-based organization, CHILDLINE serves the whole city of Shimoga. Depending on the severity of the cases, it occasionally steps in to address cases that are received from outside its area of responsibility. CHILDLINE As it enters its eleventh year of operation, Shimoga has been instrumental in meeting the needs of children who are experiencing difficulties.



CALL STATISTICAL AND CASE INTERVENTION:

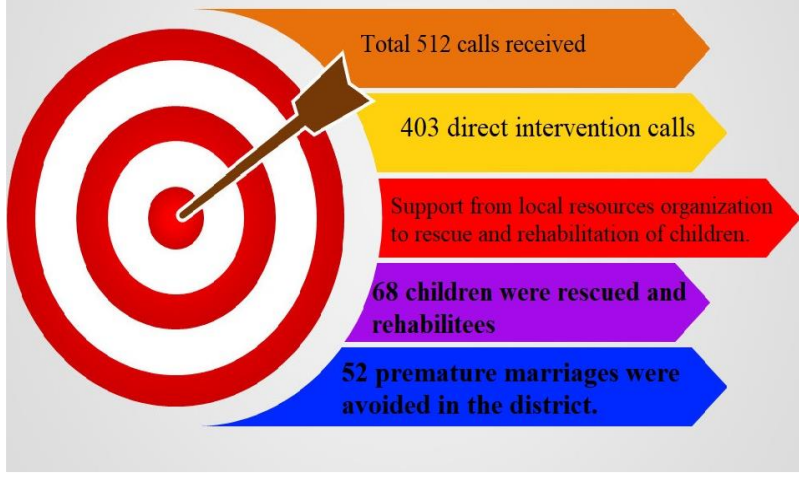
Child Line answers to every call in accordance with its credo because every call is significant. Since its launch, CHILDLINE Shimoga has been receiving calls from kids and worried adults who are trying to help kids in need. CHILDLINE seeks to safeguard children's rights and guarantee that children in need of care and protection have access to high-quality services. Children who contacted 1098 for a variety of needs, including medical aid, shelter, repatriation, emotional support and guidance, tracking down missing children, helping children who have experienced physical or sexual abuse, offering sponsorship, and other interventions on violations of children's rights, have been able to receive high-quality services from CHILDLINE Shimoga.

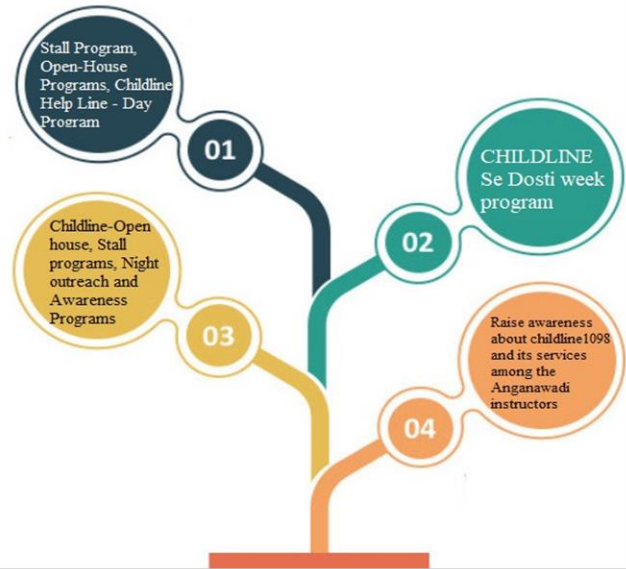

2. WOMEN EMPOWERMENT PROGRAMME (WEP)

The primary goal of KROSS's women empowerment program is to strengthen women's social, economic, political, and legal clout in order to guarantee equal rights for all women, give them the confidence to assert their rights, and enable them to live with dignity and self-respect. Encourage

and empower women in our operational area to participate as much as possible in local institutions in order to become successful social leaders. Women's empowerment is a key component of MSSS's operations and is represented in the organization's mission. The primary strategies for women's empowerment in our operational area include federating to take up

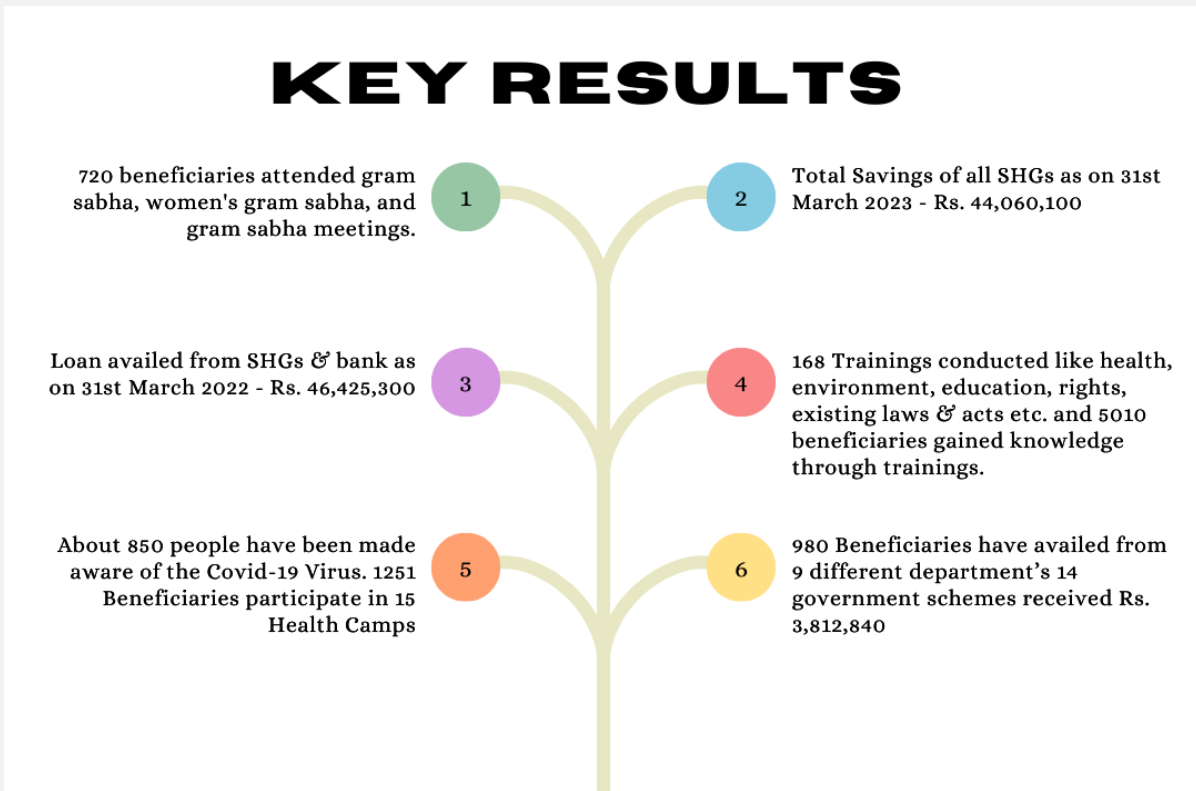


political aspects of obtaining rights and entitlements and organizing women into community-based organizations to improve their socioeconomic capacities. This project's overarching objective is the self-determination of women from societally oppressed groups, including Dalits and indigenous people. They can now jointly assert their social and familial rights.

Women empowerment refers to the process of giving women the strength, confidence, and authority to take control of their lives, make independent decisions, and achieve their full potential. It is a multifaceted concept that encompasses social, economic, political, and personal dimensions, aiming to break down barriers that prevent women from living free and fulfilled lives. This journey toward empowerment is crucial not only for women but for society as a whole, as it promotes gender equality and fosters inclusive growth.

To increase their socioeconomic potential, the women are organized into community-based organizations. This project's main objective is to empower women from especially oppressed groups in society, like Dalits and indigenous people, to exercise their right to self-determination and autonomy. They can now collectively assert their rights from both society and their families.

KEY RESULTS



3. WOMEN IN MICRO ENTERPRISES (WME)

The name of the project itself reflects its core objective—encouraging and fostering entrepreneurship among women from marginalized communities. Recognizing the potential for economic empowerment in these communities, the project aims to provide the necessary financial resources and support to help women become self-sufficient entrepreneurs. To achieve this, the Malnad Social Service Society (MSSS) collaborates with the SAMRUDI Rural Upliftment Foundation, based in Bangalore. This partnership ensures that the benefits of the project reach the women from the most economically disadvantaged backgrounds, giving them the tools they need to uplift themselves and their families.

One of the key features of the project is the disbursement of loans to families, facilitated through Self-Help Groups (SHGs). The loans, which can go up to Rs. 25,000, are offered at the lowest possible interest rates, with flexible repayment terms. This ensures that the financial burden on the families is minimal, allowing them to focus on



business development without the stress of heavy debt repayment. The loans are aimed at motivating and empowering women who have latent entrepreneurial potential but lack access to capital or support.

To ensure that the project is effective, MSSS has implemented a grading system for the SHGs. Only those SHGs that receive an 'A' grade are eligible for the loan facilities. This grading system ensures that the groups involved are well-organized and capable of responsibly managing the funds, which in turn increases the likelihood of the project's success. The SAMRUDI Foundation's involvement in this initiative is a testament to their dedication to community service and their commitment to improving the lives of marginalized women.

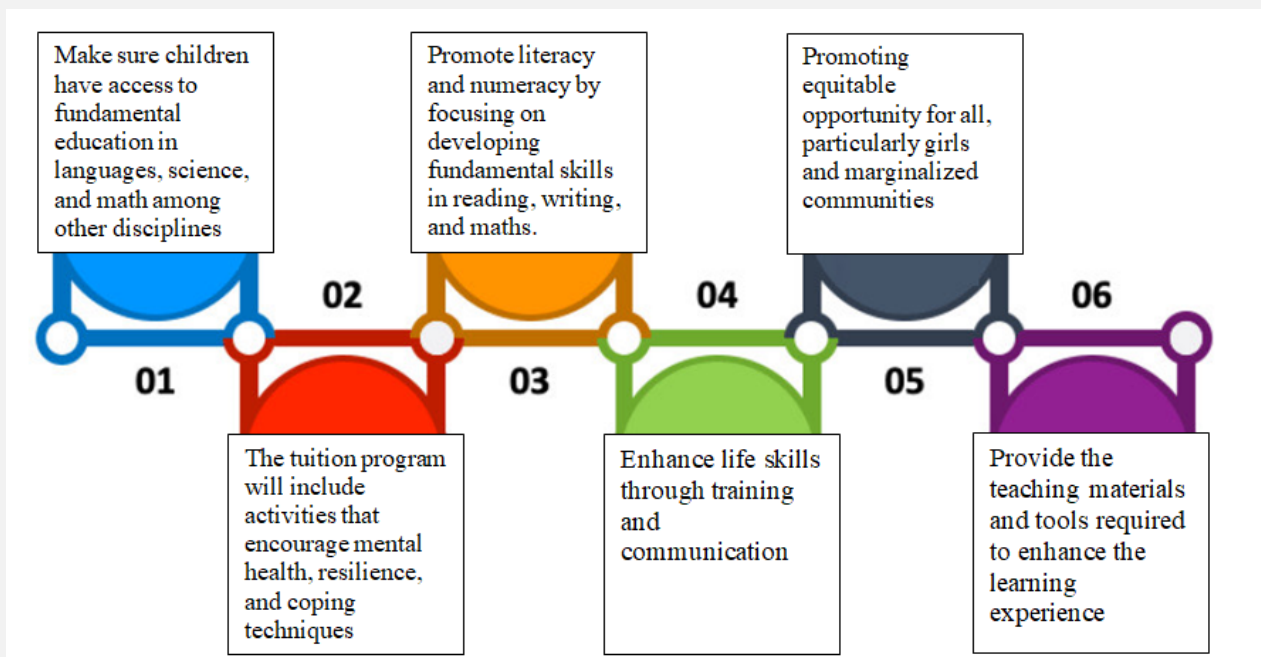
4. TENT-TUITION PROGRAM

"Tuition for Tent Children" describes educational programs designed to give kids who live in makeshift or temporary shelters, like tents or refugee camps, access to schooling. These kids frequently deal with serious issues like interrupted schooling, a lack of finances, and challenging living circumstances. Due to economic challenges, emergencies, or conflicts, many of them are displaced, and regular educational opportunities might not be available.

It is essential for these kids' growth and future opportunities that they get tuition. By giving students the opportunity to make up lost classes, gain necessary skills, and ultimately reintegrate into official educational systems or get ready for future employment, it helps close the educational gap. Additionally, education is essential for building resilience in kids by providing them with hope and a feeling of normalcy in times of uncertainty.

Children living in tent settlements can receive tutoring and educational resources through the Tent Tuition initiative. In addition to emphasizing language, math, and science, these programs offer psychosocial support to help kids deal with trauma. Through education, it is hoped that these kids would have access to a better, more secure future, even if they are living in temporary housing.

5. TUITION FOR SLUM CHILDREN

Special education initiatives designed to assist children living in impoverished regions or slums are referred to as "tuition for slum children." These kids frequently deal with a variety of issues, such as a shortage of educational opportunities, study resources, and funds for tuition. Education is not often a top concern in slums, where many families live in poverty.

Extra classes are provided by tuition programs to assist these kids in learning fundamental areas. They can catch up on their education and develop new talents in these classes, which will benefit them both in school and in their future. Each child in these programs receives individualized attention from their teachers.

In addition to aiding with education, these programs provide kids more self-assurance and optimism for the future. By helping to end the cycle of poverty, education can provide these kids with the opportunity to realize their aspirations.



6. MAZDOOR SURAKSHA YOJANA (MSY)

Mazdoor Suraksha Yojana (MSY) is a significant initiative launched by the Workers India Federation in collaboration with the Labor Commission of the Catholic Bishops Conference of India. The primary focus of this initiative is to provide a safety net to unorganized workers, particularly those involved in agriculture, self-employment, or daily wage labor. These workers, often part of the most vulnerable sections of society, generally lack access to formal social security systems, including retirement savings or pension plans. MSY seeks to address this gap by offering an insurance-linked pension scheme tailored specifically for these individuals.

A key feature of the Mazdoor Suraksha Yojana is its alignment with the Swavalamban scheme, a government-backed retirement pension program. Under Swavalamban, the central government offers a subsidy of Rs. 1000 per year to each participant in the scheme, making it more affordable and accessible for low-income workers. The workers themselves contribute a minimum of Rs. 100 annually, with the option to contribute more, up to Rs. 12,000, based on their financial capacity. This flexible contribution model ensures that even workers with limited or fluctuating incomes can participate and plan for their retirement.

The efforts of MSSS, in collaboration with the Workers India Federation, have been instrumental in driving participation in the MSY scheme. MSSS successfully enrolled 543 pensioners in the program, demonstrating the initiative's reach and impact. As of now, 269 of these members have renewed their contributions, which show the growing awareness and trust in the program.

By offering an affordable and government-supported pension plan, MSY helps unorganized workers secure their financial future and provides them with peace of mind, particularly as they move toward retirement age. This initiative is a critical step in promoting social equity and financial stability among some of India's most marginalized workers.

7. NAVAJEEVAN COMMUNITY CARE CENTRE (NCCC)

The Malnad Social Service Society (MSSS) launched its community care program over a decade ago with a clear and compassionate vision: to improve the quality of life for people living with HIV/AIDS and reduce their vulnerability. Understanding the complex challenges faced by these individuals—ranging from poor healthcare access to societal stigma—MSSS set out to provide comprehensive support that extends beyond medical treatment. The program emphasizes improving

clinical services, ensuring that those affected by HIV/AIDS receive timely, quality medical care and counseling, which are crucial in managing the disease and improving overall well-being.

MSSS also recognized the importance of integrating social services into the program. Beyond healthcare, individuals living with HIV/AIDS often need assistance with issues like social isolation, economic hardship, and discrimination. Therefore, the initiative works to link affected individuals to relevant social services, including counseling, livelihood support, and educational programs, which empower them to lead more stable and fulfilling lives.



A key aspect of the program is fostering community responses. MSSS has worked to educate and mobilize local communities to create a more supportive environment for people living with

HIV/AIDS, reducing stigma and encouraging inclusion. By addressing both the clinical and social needs, MSSS is helping to create a holistic, sustainable model of care.

Objectives

- Improve access and adherence to Anti-Retroviral Treatment (ART) by strengthening family and community care and providing psychosocial support to individuals.
- To bridge the gap between hospital and home care, individuals living with HIV require support to manage physical, emotional, social, psychological, and spiritual stressors.
- Educating and empowering individuals to prevent HIV and AIDS transmission.
- Initiated outreach services to improve people's well-being and ART treatment to prevent relapses.
- Connecting with the public and private sectors to provide comprehensive care throughout the continent.
- Developing HIV/AIDS resistance in the Shimoga region of Karnataka.

8. SPARSHA

Too often, we underestimate the profound healing power of human touch, a force so powerful that it can revitalize and breathe new life into a person. The touch of selfless love and service holds the potential to enhance and uplift the human spirit, bringing beauty and grace to the lives of those it touches. This idea is central to the SPARSHA campaign against cancer, an initiative under the banner of Caritas India, New Delhi, which has witnessed numerous instances of transformation in the lives of people battling cancer.

SPARSHA is not just about physical care; its charism lies in instilling hope in those diagnosed with cancer, a quality that can often be as important as the medical treatments themselves. Hope helps people navigate their darkest moments, allowing them to persevere through the emotional and physical challenges that cancer



presents. A shining example of this was seen during an awareness program when a woman battling cancer, full of buoyant and encouraging energy, was felicitated. Her resilience symbolized the strength that SPARSHA seeks to inspire in all its beneficiaries. This is just one of the many examples that highlight the transformative and healing power of SPARSHA, which touches lives in ways that go far beyond medical treatment.

The goal of the campaign is to raise cancer awareness among the people of Shimoga and Chikmagalur. A key focus is to dispel common myths and misconceptions that lead to fear and stigma surrounding the disease. By concentrating on education, the campaign helps people recognize the early signs and symptoms of cancer, encouraging them to seek timely medical help. Additionally, it emphasizes the importance of screening for early detection, which significantly improves treatment outcomes. This awareness initiative has proven effective in reducing the incidence of advanced-stage cancer diagnoses, contributing to better health outcomes for the community.

Some of the common myths about this grave illness are as follows:



The project focuses on promoting public awareness about cancer and highlighting the crucial role of early detection in effective treatment. By raising awareness, people can make informed choices, leading to healthier lifestyles that reduce cancer risks. The project emphasizes the need to address harmful habits and lifestyles that contribute to the onset of cancer. Encouraging the adoption of a

healthier lifestyle is key to prevention, and the project advocates for practices like organic farming and kitchen gardening to support nutritious diets. Sharing cancer survivor stories also plays a significant role, offering hope and confidence to those affected by the disease.

The focus of this initiative is to educate the public about the key risk factors associated with cancer, as over 30% of cancer cases can be prevented by adopting healthier lifestyles or avoiding certain risks. By raising awareness, people can modify their behaviors to lower their chances of developing cancer. The program emphasizes the importance of regular screening and check-ups, which are essential for early detection. Specifically, women are informed about mammograms, clinical breast exams, breast self-exams, and Pap smear tests, which help in the early detection of breast and cervical cancers. These efforts, carried out by MSSS under the Diocese of Bhadravathi, aim to improve cancer prevention and treatment in the region.

This encourages people to grow vegetables in their gardens and available spaces, promoting healthier eating habits and further reducing cancer risk. These combined efforts are expected to be highly effective in lowering cancer incidence.

A significant component of this initiative is promoting the importance of regular screenings and check-ups. Early detection plays a critical role in improving cancer treatment outcomes and survival rates.

For women, the program specifically focuses on breast cancer and cervical cancer prevention. Women are educated about vital screenings such as mammograms, clinical breast exams, breast self-exams, and Pap smears. These tests help in early detection, when treatment is most effective. The program, spearheaded by MSSS under the Diocese of Bhadravathi, aims to reduce the incidence of these cancers in the region by fostering better awareness and access to necessary health services.

Moreover, two key initiatives are being implemented to further promote healthy living. First, the free distribution of organic seeds encourages community members to grow vegetables in their gardens and available spaces. This initiative promotes the consumption of fresh, nutritious food, which can significantly reduce cancer risk. By combining awareness campaigns with practical health-focused initiatives, this program strives to effectively lower cancer rates in the area.
